A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Entering a new decade this year has given me a basis to reflect on how far we have come in the last 10 years.

In 10 years we have more than doubled the number of patients we support at home, which now stands at over 2500 a year and 800 at any given time.

We've introduced our First Contact Centre, which provides new and existing service users with fast and efficient support. This extends to cover overnight to support patients at home and provide immediate advice, support and visits where necessary.

The opening of our Health & Wellbeing Centre in Winchmore Hill is central to us being able to support people facing life-limiting illness to live life as well as they can.

Together with the outstanding care on our In patient unit, our staff do an exceptional job of supporting patients, their families, carers and friends.

The growth in our services to meet the needs of our community also means costs have increased too. As a charity, there has never been a more challenging time. We receive £4 million from the NHS but need to fundraise an additional £9 million to cover the total cost of running the Hospice every year.

We have 17 shops across the three boroughs, which contribute considerably to our purse and I'm delighted to announce we'll soon be opening an 18th shop, a furniture shop in Barnet.

Our biggest fundraiser of the year, Big Fun Walk, is also round the corner on Sunday 3 May and is a wonderful event to be part of. Do take a look at the events pages for our extensive programme of activity – there's something for everyone!

We've recently presented a host of long-service awards to staff and volunteers who have marked 20 and 25 years service to the Hospice. An incredible achievement and we are very grateful for their many years of support



I HAVEN'T COME THIS FAR TO ONLY COME THIS FAR

hen Jack Morgan passed away at just 22-yearsold, he'd achieved more than many who have lived over 70 years on this Earth.

He became an inspiration as he blogged on Instagram (itsme_jmo) about every step of his two-year journey with a rare form of cancer. His determination, openness and honesty in his posts led to a following of almost 30,000 and support from across the world, including footballer Paul Pogba and musician Craig David.

Jack beat Stage 3 cancer but when it returned and the chemo was unsuccessful he embarked on a clinical trial in Belgium in March 2019 and

began receiving support from North London Hospice.

NLH provided symptom relief at home in Barnet to the graduate of Bristol University, whose Department of Engineering and Maths has since created the Jack Morgan Award for Ardour in his memory. A proud moment for the family, as was attending Jack's graduation ceremony on his behalf in February 2020. Parents Grant and Emma and his three siblings, Joshua, 22 and 18-year-old twins Charlotte and Sam were all there.

North London Hospice's Dr Jo Brady and nurse Kevin Yates visited Jack regularly to help with his symptom management. "Jack and Dr Jo are angels on Earth," explained Jack's dad Grant. "Jo was, and still is, an incredible support. Jack had a phenomenal brain and it felt like he knew more about his condition than many medical

professionals. He wanted to understand what was happening to him and shared his experiences with the wider world."

In the summer of 2019 it was suggested Jack came into the Hospice's Finchley in-patient unit for a week for specialist care.

"He didn't want to come in but Dr Jo explained that many people come for symptom management and then go home. And when we arrived it had a very homely environment. The staff were phenomenal; the nurses so caring. We as a family have never experienced anything like that level of care and compassion before."

After a week Jack left the Hospice and spent two weeks in hospital before returning home in August, where he received the devastating news that the clinical trial hadn't worked.

"Jack really wanted to be at home and we wanted him

there too. He needed specialist equipment and the Hospice just made it happen. They took all the stress of the admin and phone calls away and arranged all the things he needed."

Jack passed at home at 1.30am on August 26, surrounded by his family. "He'd made the decision to pass on this particular fight, part company with his nemesis and focus his energies elsewhere. The hospice provided a nurse on that night and she was there to make things that bit easier for Jack and all of us".

"People perceive that a hospice is all about end-oflife care...but it's so much more than that. Our own experience is testament to this. Five months after

Jack passed, we still have a relationship with North London Hospice."

Dr Jo Brady added: "Jack truly was a remarkable young man who, through his brilliant brain, taught me lots about science and we negotiated treatment plans collaboratively. But more than that he taught me to live life as fully as possible, to keep fighting for a better day and the power of sharing stories. I feel lucky to have spent time with him and his family and am eternally grateful for their support of the hospice. He leaves a footprint in my heart."


JACKS LEGACY

Jack had a passion for Al (artificial intelligence) and the science behind it. During his illness he put his knowledge and experience together and worked with Bradley Gudger to create an app called Alike (www.alike.org.uk) to bring people affected by cancer together. "He was totally selfless and always wanted to help others," said Grant. Fundraising is underway to bring the app to market in the coming year and Jack will be made an Honoury Patron. It's one of many projects the Morgan family have planned as part of Jack's legacy.



The Morgan family and Jack's friends have already raised thousands of pounds for causes and charities that supported Jack, including North London Hospice, which received over £9000 from a football tournament arranged by his best friend Teddie in November. (See Page 11 for full story)

Throughout his illness Jack's mantra became 'I haven't come this far to only come this far' and this powerful message is set to be used on a new fashion collection launching on 29 February 2020 created by the presenter of You, Me and the Big C, Lauren Mahon. Proceeds from the collection will be donated to North London Hospice.



LILA CHINMAN



ila Chinman was one of our longest serving volunteers, and for many years provided weekly help on our Finchley ward. Her infectious smile and friendly manner meant she was much loved by staff and patients alike.

Age was just a number to Lila, who even at 89 was still volunteering her time to North London Hospice and its patients, almost

25 years after she first walked through the door. But in September 2019 her COPD meant she finally had to stop her visits and she sadly died on our ward, the place she had dedicated so much time, on 17 December.

"She was in the Hospice for five days and that was exactly where she wanted to die," said Lila's daughter Sukie. "From the moment she arrived she was calm and happy, after being thoroughly miserable in hospital."

Lila lived in Cockfosters and had three children with Len, her husband of 61 years - Meryl, Sukie and Robbie. The couple also had six grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren (with a 13th on the way). Her interests included golf and bridge and she was a 'prolific knitter' explained Sukie. "Mum knitted all her life and it was a fitting tribute that her entire family wore something knitted by her at her funeral."

Sukie added: "Mum absolutely loved helping at North London Hospice. She felt needed here. She would chat to patients but over the years she helped in many areas including the laundry and the kitchen. She had hoped to continue until her 90th birthday but was just three months short of that. She was our hero and is very much missed."

Tribute to Lila & Len

Lila is also missed by her friends and colleagues at NLH. Her family have purchased a gold leaf in memory of Lila and Len, who also died peacefully on our Finchley ward



eight years ago, to go on our beautiful Tribute Tree. This provides funds that help us continue to support our patients and their families. Each leaf is engraved with the name of a loved one and remains on the tree for a year.


KEEP ON RUNNING...

HOSPICE PATIENT PHOTOGRAPHY GROUP HOLDS SUCCESSFUL FIRST EXHIBITION

North London Hospice's patient and carer photography group – Catching The Light – all have one thing in common. A passion for life.

"We're not dead yet! We have a lot of life left to live and a lot of passions," says founding member Karen.

The group is made up of members from all walks of life – including engineers, lawyers and sales managers – all of whom love looking at life through the lens.

EXHIBITION

After two years, our Catching The Light members were delighted to hold their very first exhibition on Thursday 5 December at our Health & Wellbeing Centre. More than 100 people came along to see the work of the group that was founded two years ago.

Catching The Light members meet monthly for photography walks through London as well as practical studio sessions to improve their skills.

The exhibition was an eclectic mix of images taken by past and present members ranging from mountain landscapes and seascapes, portraits, stunning plant life in summer and autumn and a fabulous collection of Stairways. A series of photographs showing the group in action also ran alongside the exhibition.





We were delighted that sales on the night raised around £1000 for patient care, and the exhibition was a poignant reminder that those facing a life limiting or terminal illness want to be viewed as more than just their condition.

"Yes many of us are terminally ill, but there's a lot of things you can do with you life before your expiry date," added Karen.

"We also wanted this exhibition to provide a reason for people to come and see the Health & Wellbeing Centre and to appreciate this magnificent space. It's a very peaceful space. We wanted to demystify it to people and to help others who may be facing a life-limiting illness understand it's a place they can come to for support."



BEHIND THE CANCER WE STILL ALL HAVE SKILLS

Ajay and his wife Sharon were part of the core group who founded Catching the Light in November 2017, which is predominantly made up of patients but also welcomes carers and family members. He added: "When we started we had no real plan. Photography skills ranged from zero to quite experienced. Some people used their phones and others had the full kit. But it gave us another purpose in life and for some, it was a reason to get out of bed in the morning.

"It's turned into a very therapeutic group that has helped stimulate conversation and friendships. Behind the cancer we all have skills and jobs and this exhibition has enabled us to combine our skills. Some of the photographs have real meaning to the person who has taken them, and we hoped that people who viewed them would not only see them as great pieces of artwork they would be happy to hang on their walls, but also understand the history behind them."

THE POWER OF MUSIC

Thanks to a partnership with Nordoff Robbins, we are able to offer music therapy to our patients this year.

Nordoff Robbins Music Therapist Abbie Francis spends a day a week at NLH working with patients at our Finchley site & Health & Wellbeing Centre.

Nordoff Robbins is the largest independent music therapy charity in the UK, dedicated to enriching the lives of people affected by life limiting illness, isolation or disability. It supports thousands of people through its own centres and by working in partnership with organisations including care homes, schools and hospitals, and in Health and Wellbeing centres like ours.

Abbie holds individual sessions and each week patients, volunteers and staff are encouraged to join her in our communal areas for informal music sessions where they sing, tap or play along.



POWERFUL EXPERIENCE

The individual sessions can be of great comfort explains Abbie: "This can be a powerful experience for a patient. Being with someone at their bedside, when often communication is lost or difficult, they find a sense of companionship. And working with patients attending the Health & Wellbeing Centre provides an opportunity to create something, like a piece of music, to leave as part of their legacy. Learning a new skill or being creative provides a distraction or stress release."

Abbie also works with our bereavement support team and in the run up to National Grief Awareness Week in December she worked with a group to write a song about their journeys through grief and bereavement and shared experiences.

"The end product was a beautiful song, with verses representing the rawness, pain and heartbreak, set against an optimistic chorus which gives their advice on how to keep going," Explained Abbie. "The final verse looks forward, talks of healing with time, pushing through, and writing a new chapter without forgetting the book so far."

The group performed the song beautifully at our Catching the Light Photography Exhibition at the Health & Wellbeing Centre during the Grief Awareness Week in December. They sang to a large audience, and received some great feedback. It was an emotional performance, but their message sang through.

Abbie added: "Members of the group shared their experience of the importance of connecting with others who understand their situation and 'speak the same language'. They and I are keen to run a similar group in 2020."

LETS TALK TO **CHILDREN ABOUT DYING**



Charities like North London Hospice & Noah's Ark have developed learning in how active listening enables people to work through their grief. We will once again be running our 'Supporting Young People Facing Bereavement' one-day course for teaching staff and those working in education this year. The course provides tools to support children at this vulnerable time in their lives. The course date will be posted in the Education section on our website once confirmed.

Brits struggle to talk about death. A 2015 survey by the Dying Matters Coalition found that nearly three-quarters of us believe that our fellow Britons are uncomfortable discussing bereavement.

But we know that the right words can have immense power throughout the bereavement process.

And knowing what to say to a child or young person can be particularly important for teaching staff when you hear that on average one child in every classroom has been bereaved of a parent or sibling.

Using the right words

When speaking to a young person who has faced bereavement, the greatest challenge is how to actively listen to them. It's something that even those who are highly experienced at communicating with children, such as teachers, need to keep at the front of their mind. 'Active listening' means being led by the person who you are speaking to, rather than thinking what you're going to say next; it means acknowledging their situation; and, most importantly, it means that when you do talk, trying to find the right words.

There is no 'right way' to respond and therefore finding the 'right words' is hard, but there are ways to avoid the wrong words, for example by avoiding unhelpful comments such as 'I know how you feel' or 'they've gone to a better place'.

People are understandably concerned about saying the wrong thing, which can stop them reaching out to a bereaved person. But it's so often just the being there. being present, that is the most important thing to do.

Going to a better place

Catherine Toohey, Head of Family Link and Therapies at Noah's Ark Children's Hospice, discusses the right and wrong ways to talk about bereavement

Mainstream society often uses terrible euphemisms to describe dying. Someone has "passed on" or "passed away"; like second-hand clothing. We've "lost someone"; will we find them later? And the one that really bothers me - they've "gone to a better place"; as if death and the seaside are somehow placed on a par!

Supporting young people, in particular, facing bereavement needs care, thought and great tact.




































LIGHT UPA LIFE 2019


